THE GREAT IMCZ DOWNHILL (well almost) BICYCLE RIDE FROM AIROLO TO BIASCA

Sunday July 30th 1995

We take a train from Zug direct to Airola. There we collect our SBB (7 speed) bicycles and cycle to Biasca via Piotta, Faido, Chiggiogna and Giornico stopping on the way for sight seeing, refreshments and lunch. The lunch stop (at approx. midday) will be at the Grotto Pescatori in Giornico, a delightful spot on the banks of a mountain stream. In Biasca we return the cycles to the SBB and board a return train to Zug. Total distance of the ride is 40 km - the leaflet says '40 Kilometer rasante Abfahrt und ein Minimum an Muskelkjraft'.



Meet at 08.10 hrs in the Zug Bahnhof ticket office We will buy the tickets and reserve the cycles together. Train departure time from Zug is 08.34 hrs (arrive Airolo 09.58 hrs).

2nd class train fare (return) per person, including cycle hire, is Fr 67.-- (or Fr 46.-- if you have a half price pass).

Refreshment and lunch costs are at your discretion. We can tell you that charges at the Grotto Pescatori are very modest.

It is suggested that you bring sunglasses and suntan cream. Maps are not needed because Rudi Schaller will be navigating.

In case of bad weather you can confirm with Rudi Schaller up to 07.50 hrs on the actual morning.

Departure from Biasca to Zug will depend on when we arrive there, but a train departs from Biasca every hour.
