
### **16th – 18th June**

### **Goldsmith Tour – "Diamonds are forever"**

With the intention to delight the senses for both ladies and gentlemen, the Tour of the Lohri House was an event actively organised by Richard Beswick, President of the Zug International Men's Club and with Ms. Nadya Alessandri, CEO Lohri Chronometry and Jewellery.

This guided tour received many early and eager registrations, exceeding the exclusive group limit and nevertheless being kindly accommodated by Lohri

Lohri's CEO, Nadya Alessandri warmly ushered guests through the arched door surrounded by the impressive pillars at Lohri's prestigious showroom of Neugasse 27 in Zug's old town.

On a warm summer evening in June, members sipped on refreshingly sweet raspberry and chilled citrus mint cocktails waiting for the tour to begin.

Owner Franz Lohri officially welcomed the group on the 16th century ground floor explaining that, due to the large size, the tour of the building would be organised in two parallel groups, each comprising around twelve very enthusiastic members.

The honour of being a family operated business with deep and historical ties to Zug were clear as Mr. Lohri spoke with pride about the high-end watch and fine jewellery business he successfully runs with son, Franco Lohri.

The tour on the first floor was guided by the highly knowledgeable, Ms. Sonja Wismer, who takes pride in working for Lohri, highly evident as she explained the details and significance of collecting vintage and precious jewellery from 19th and 20th century.

Tiaras, rings, necklaces, delicately designed gold cuffs and several other unique jewellery creations are displayed as works of art in glass cases adorning the walls on the first floor.

In the centre of the room are showcases displaying some of the finest rubies, diamonds, emerald and other precious stones in vibrant colours. All of the collectors' pieces are designed with unparalleled skill

and craftsmanship.

Members were especially in awe of the pearl and ruby arrangement lips created by Henryk Kaston, on a design by the renowned Salvador Dali.

Ladies were even invited to try on some of the finest jewellery pieces, such as a roughly six carat diamond ring- an offer that was not passed up!

Equally, if not more impressive, albeit for different reasons, is the Wedding Ring Salon, located on the second floor where the next

part of the group tour continued.

The salon is elegantly styled for couples to be married or those who wish to renew their wedding vows with champagne to toast. Displays of a wide variety of classic as well as contemporary wedding bands and engagement rings are discreet enough to preserve the sanctity of a serene dream.

This room is designed with one purpose alone - to inspire romance and intimacy. The setting is perfect; one that has stood the test of time and therefore most suitable for a couple's promise to marry. Unsurprisingly, it reminds the guests that they are part of something eternal and can be eternally in love. "Ewigi Liebi"

It was here that members asked their various questions on topics ranging from the building's architecture and renovation, to jewellery workmanship; Mr. Lohri answered the questions personally and very patiently, sensing the endless curiosity of an enthusiastic crowd. The opportunity for the guests to browse through the carefully prepared and arranged photos, including those of the building's exterior was value added to the tour's already highly visual appeal.

When it was possible to take one's eyes away from the sparkle of the finest treasures, then one could appreciate the intricate details of the stucco ceiling adorned with cherubs as well as the grandeur of the chandeliers.

The importance of preservation and continuity rang throughout the tour.

At the end of the tour, walking down the same red carpet staircase we had walked up took on a very special meaning. The effort made to preserve this building and its discoveries, such as the original wallpaper and coverings are very impressive.



Under ceilings painted with laurel motives, participating members had the opportunity to ask Lohri's team many more individual questions about jewellery and watch models.

As we waited in line to leave, Mr. Franz Lohri, Mrs Nadya Alessandri personally stood at the door warmly bidding farewell to the genuinely impressed members.

## Golden rice - The Seed Has Sprouted

Autumn 2022 will go down in the annals of agricultural history: For the first time, farmers in the Philippines harvested a large quantity of so-called "golden rice", which has an increased content of beta-carotene (provitamin A) thanks to a maize gene. As in other plants, beta-carotene is the colouring agent and leads to a golden-yellow colour of the modified rice. In total, over 67 tons were obtained from several locations and this will now be distributed to those households where preschool children at high risk of vitamin A deficiency diseases or pregnant women or nursing mothers live. Children in particular go blind, die from a weak immune system and suffer from cognitive impairments from vitamin A deficiency. Worldwide, several hundred million children are affected by such health consequences.



A lack of vitamin A, though virtually unknown in western countries, is widespread in the third world and developing countries (see graph, WHO 2009), and is believed to be responsible for killing more children than HIV, tuberculosis, or malaria - around 2000 deaths a day. On a global scale, about a third of children under five suffer from the condition. In order to combat vitamin A malnutrition - the so-called "hidden hunger" - scientists at ETH Zurich have, since the early 1990s, been developing a genetically modified rice so that the plants accumulate beta-carotene in their grains. Beta-carotene is converted into the vital vitamin A in the body. In this way, people in countries where rice is the most important source of carbohydrates would be better able to meet their daily vitamin A requirements. In the following years, the efficiency of beta-carotene production in Golden Rice could be further increased to achieve a sufficiently high amount per daily ration, and in 2018, all regulatory and safety hurdles were finally overcome. In 2021, the Philippines became the first country to give the green light for the cultivation and consumption of Golden Rice in the open. Many other countries such as Bangladesh,

Indonesia, Vietnam, India and China have therefore taken the same steps as the Philippines and are well advanced in the introduction of vitamin A rice.

Golden Rice has been fiercely controversial since its creation. Its use was blocked, delayed and postponed for years. Environmental groups in particular bitterly fought this genetically modified crop (and others), despite the fact that Golden Rice was the first project to use genetic engineering not only for commercial agriculture, but as a humanitarian project to solve a major health problem. In particular Greenpeace, have tried to block approval of Golden Rice because of their general opposition to GM crops. Perhaps the opposition to Golden Rice was especially persistent because it was a GM crop that had so much going for it, the potential to change public opinion about genetic modification in food in general. Nevertheless, this opposition did not have the power to stop Golden Rice on its own, but authorities withheld approval of free cultivation. The problem is related to an international treaty known as the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety, an agreement which aims to ensure the safe handling, transport and use of living modified organisms, and which came into force in 2003. The Cartagena Protocol contains a highly controversial clause known as "the precautionary principle". This states that if a product of modern



biotechnology poses a possible risk to human health or the environment, measures should be taken to restrict or prevent its introduction. The doctrine, in the case of Golden Rice, was interpreted as "guilty until proven innocent", an attitude entirely unreasonable given the potential of the crop to save millions of lives and halt blindness. As a result, politics and regulations delayed approval for many years, during which millions of children lost their sight or died of malnutrition.

At present, researchers work on the expansion of Golden Rice' health benefits and try to develop strains with increased contents of zinc and iron, two of the most deficient minerals globally. In some South-Asian countries like Bangladesh such modifications are already ongoing. Indeed, if the Golden rice will fulfil the expectations of its health benefits, hopefully this will also lead to a more positive overall perception of GMO in food. It is an irritating discrepancy how easily most people accepted the vaccination with a GMO vaccine, while in contrast with an irrational and fierce attitude vote against a simple gene modification in plants (much more targeted and far less invasive than traditional botanical crosses). With the help of gene modification plants could be made e.g. more tolerant to heat, saline soils, droughts, and parasites, and like this increase harvest yields and help to secure global food supply.

# ChatGPT for Mental Healthcare - Filling the Void Article Contributed by IMCZ President, Richard B. Alan Cattell and ChatGPT

Applications for ChatGPT (and other Large Language Model based Al tools) are springing up in finance, technology and life sciences. This article looks at how ChatGPT and its derivatives could enhance universal social and individual well-being through psychotherapy support.

With the increasing prevalence of mental health conditions and the strain on mental health services, there is potential for integrating generative AI solutions, such as ChatGPT, into existing mental health resources. Generative AI, a rapidly advancing technology, has the potential to bridge the gap between the growing demand for mental health support and the limited availability of resources. There is already evidence that leveraging this technology could provide accessible, affordable, and stigma-free mental healthcare to a wider population, while recognising the need to remain vigilant on the limitations and ethical implications of machine-based psychotherapy.

To delve into the matter what better than to ask GPT to provide an opinion on 'the role and potential of large language model ai in psychotherapy'. Alan Cattell deftly posed the question and GPT responded with measured and emphatic first level reply to the question:

### **Al Cannot Replace Human Therapists**

Psychotherapy is a crucial aspect of mental health care, and recent advancements in artificial intelligence (AI) have opened up new possibilities in this field. Large language model AI, such as the GPT-3.5 architecture, has the potential to support individuals on their mental health journey. While AI cannot replace human therapists, it can offer supplemental resources, anonymous accessibility, and emotional support. However, ethical considerations, limitations, and the need for a collaborative approach must be taken into account when implementing AI in psychotherapy.

### **Supplemental Support** and Resources

One significant advantage of using large language model Al in psychotherapy is its ability to provide supplemental support and resources. Al can offer information, coping strategies, and self-help techniques to individuals seeking assistance. It acts as a valuable tool for self-reflection and self-guided interventions, enabling users to gain insights into their thoughts, feelings, and behaviour. By providing accurate and up-to-date information on mental health conditions, symptoms, and treatment options, Al-based systems can serve as an educational resource for individuals looking to better understand their experiences.

### **Anonymous Accessibility**

Al-based psychotherapy offers anonymous accessibility, a feature that can be particularly beneficial for individuals facing barriers in seeking traditional therapy. Geographical limitations, social stigma, or financial constraints often deter individuals from seeking help. By enabling individuals to access support from the comfort and privacy of their own homes, Al-based systems reduce these barriers and increase access to mental health care. The anonymity provided by Al allows individuals to express their emotions and concerns without the fear of judgment or stigma, creating a safe and confidential space for them to explore their thoughts and feelings.

### **Emotional Support**

While Al cannot replicate the depth of human empathy, it can provide emotional support through empathetic responses and active listening. Al-based systems can acknowledge and validate the emotions expressed by individuals, providing a sense of understanding and companionship. Although the responses generated by Al are not driven



by genuine emotions, they can still offer comfort and encouragement to those seeking support. By allowing individuals to express their emotions and thoughts, Al-based systems create an outlet for venting and self-expression, which can be helpful for some individuals in managing their mental health.

### **Ethical Considerations**

The use of AI in psychotherapy raises important ethical considerations. Privacy and data security are paramount, and it is crucial to ensure that user data is protected and handled in a responsible manner. Additionally, there is a need for transparency in how AI systems process and generate responses, so that users understand the limitations and potential biases involved. Developers should strive to train Al models with diverse and representative datasets to avoid perpetuating biases and ensure inclusivity. Furthermore, Al-based systems should never replace the involvement of human therapists, and users must be made aware of the limitations and potential risks of relying solely on AI for mental health support.

#### Limitations

### **The Search for Dark Energy and Dark Matter**

### Introduction

Since the dawn of history, mankind has studied the night sky and our understanding of the evolution of stars, planets and galaxies has changed significantly over the centuries. However, we currently live in a very interesting time, where we know that there are specific aspects of what we see in the cosmos that we just don't understand properly. We have theories, but no direct evidence, and we know that whatever we learn will require some fundamental extension to Physics.

In the vast tapestry of galaxies, a puzzle has emerged. Observations of galactic rotation curves show an intriguing phenomenon. Stars at the outer edges of galaxies are moving at unexpectedly high speeds, defying the expectations based on the distribution of visible matter alone. The laws of classical physics dictated that these outer regions should experience weaker gravitational forces, causing stars to move slower. However, reality presented a different picture, leading scientists to propose the existence of invisible matter, aptly named dark matter – with no direct evidence for its existence.

The concept of dark matter was first theorized in the 1930s. Swiss astronomer Fritz Zwicky was studying the motion of galaxies within the Coma Cluster and found that their speeds were much higher than expected based on the visible matter alone. Zwicky proposed that there must be an invisible, non-luminous form of matter that was responsible for the observed gravitational effects. However, his ideas were met with scepticism and did not gain widespread acceptance at the time.

The term "dark matter" itself was coined in 1978 by the American astronomer Vera Rubin and her collaborator Kent Ford. Rubin had been studying the rotation curves of galaxies, specifically looking at how the rotational velocities of stars within a galaxy changed with distance from the galactic centre. Her observations confirmed that the stars at the outer edges of galaxies were moving much faster than expected, indicating the presence of unseen matter exerting gravitational influence. Rubin referred to this unknown matter as "dark matter" in a landmark paper, sparking further interest and investigation into the phenomenon.

Since then, numerous studies and observations have provided additional evidence for the existence of dark matter, further cementing its status

as a crucial component of the universe. The prevailing understanding today is that dark matter outweighs visible matter by a significant margin, comprising about 85% of the total matter in the universe.

While the exact nature and composition of dark matter remain unknown, its existence is supported by a wide range of cosmological and astrophysical observations. But the absence of direct evidence for its existence is a real problem. Unsurprisingly, clarifying this conundrum is an active and ongoing area of research in modern astrophysics and cosmology.

### But what is Dark Matter – and does it really exist?

Dark matter is thought to be non-baryonic, meaning it does not consist of the familiar particles that make up atoms. (A baryons is a particle made from three quarks – e.g. proton and neutron.) It does not interact with light or other forms of electromagnetic radiation, making it invisible to our telescopes and detectors. While its precise composition remains uncertain, several theoretical models have been put forth. One of the leading candidates is Weakly Interacting Massive Particles (WIMPs)<sup>[1]</sup>, hypothetical particles that interact only through the weak nuclear force and gravity. Axions, sterile neutrinos, and other exotic particles have also been proposed as potential constituents of dark matter. In any case, we're looking for particles which can't be explained by the so-called "standard model" of particle physics.

The existence of dark matter has profound implications for our understanding of the universe. As mentioned, it's estimated that dark matter accounts for roughly 85% of the matter in the cosmos, outweighing visible matter by a significant margin. Without dark matter's gravitational influence, galaxies as we know them would not exist. It acts as the cosmic scaffolding, providing the gravitational glue that holds galaxies together and prevents them from disintegrating under the forces of their own rotation.

The impact of dark matter extends beyond individual galaxies. Observations of large-scale structures, such as galaxy clusters and superclusters, offer insights into its distribution and effects. Dark matter forms a cosmic web, a vast network of filaments that connect galaxies across the universe. It acts as the gravitational backbone, shaping the


structure and evolution of cosmic architecture. By mapping the distribution of dark matter, scientists can decipher the underlying cosmic blueprint and trace the intricate dance of galaxies throughout cosmic history.

Efforts to detect dark matter directly have been underway for decades (see below) but to-date, without success. While the search for dark matter intensifies, its presence raises fundamental questions about the nature of the universe and our understanding of sub-atomic physics. Dark matter's gravitational effects suggest that the universe should be on a trajectory towards eventual collapse due to the overwhelming gravitational attraction of matter. However, recent observations have revealed an accelerating expansion of the universe, driven by an unknown force known as dark energy.

### Dark Energy – even more puzzling

Dark energy, distinct from dark matter, appears to constitute about 70% of the energy density of the universe. Unlike dark matter, which attracts matter through gravitational interactions, dark

energy exerts a repulsive force, causing the expansion of the universe to accelerate. This revelation, derived from observations of distant supernovae in the late 1990s, has left scientists puzzled and searching for an explanation.

The nature of dark energy is even more enigmatic than dark matter. One possibility is that it arises from a cosmological constant, a term in Einstein's equations of general relativity that represents the energy of empty space. According to this interpretation, dark energy is a constant and uniform presence throughout the cosmos, driving the acceleration of the universe's expansion. Another possibility is that dark energy arises from a dynamic field known as quintessence, which can evolve and change over time. Quintessence would introduce a new fundamental force acting on cosmic scales. (Currently only four forces are known: gravity, electromagnetic, strong nuclear and weak nuclear.)

The interplay between dark matter and dark energy shapes the fate of the universe. Understanding their roles is crucial for deciphering the ultimate destiny of our cosmos. Various hypotheses have been proposed, each leading to distinct scenarios. If dark energy continues to dominate, the universe may expand indefinitely, with galaxies drifting apart and celestial objects becoming increasingly isolated. Alternatively, if dark matter's gravitational pull triumphs, the universe may eventually halt its expansion and transition into a cosmic contraction, leading to a "Big Crunch" or a cyclic universe.

As scientists strive to unravel the mysteries of dark matter and dark energy, new technologies and observational techniques are continually being developed. The advent of powerful telescopes, such as the James Webb Space Telescope (JWST) and the upcoming Nancy Grace Roman Space Telescope, promises to enhance our understanding of the universe's structure and evolution. These observatories will deepen

our knowledge of cosmic phenomena, providing further insights into the nature of dark matter and its role in shaping the cosmos.

In addition, sophisticated computer simulations and numerical models enable scientists to explore the behaviour of dark matter in virtual universes. By simulating the evolution of cosmic structures, researchers can compare the outcomes with observations, refining our understanding of dark matter's properties and its interaction with ordinary matter.

The quest to unravel the mysteries of dark matter continues, driven by the passion and curiosity of scientists worldwide. The exploration of this invisible entity opens new frontiers of knowledge and challenges our perception of the universe. With each observation, experiment, and theoretical breakthrough, we come closer to unravelling the enigma of dark matter, shedding light on the hidden fabric of our cosmic tapestry.

### Why does this matter?

The apparent existence of dark matter and dark energy highlight major areas of ignorance in our understanding of what matter is and how it behaves. Either our understanding of gravity is somehow fundamentally flawed or the footprints of something truly new have been discovered. Ironically, the impact is on our understanding of both the very small (the standard model of particle physics) and the very large (the dynamics of galaxies, galactic clusters and the universe as a whole). There may even be a wholly new fundamental force behind some of these phenomenon.

### **Experimental observations**

It's always possible to theorise, but the real meat is in experimental data to confirm which theories are most correct. To that end, there are many projects underway. You can find information on all of these online.

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### **Dark Matter Detection:**

- a) Direct Detection Experiments: Underground detectors, such as the Cryogenic Dark Matter Search (CDMS) and XENON, aim to capture rare interactions between dark matter particles and atomic nuclei. These experiments rely on highly sensitive detectors shielded from background radiation to detect the minuscule signals produced by potential dark matter interactions.
- b) Indirect Detection Experiments: Indirect detection techniques involve searching for the products of dark matter annihilation or decay. Instruments like the Fermi Gamma-ray Space Telescope and the Alpha Magnetic Spectrometer (AMS-02) aboard the International Space Station study the high-energy radiation emitted during dark matter interactions.
- c) Particle Colliders: Particle colliders, like the Large Hadron Collider (LHC), recreate the conditions of the early universe, aiming to produce dark matter particles through high-energy collisions. Scientists analyse the resulting debris and energy signatures in the hopes of indirectly detecting dark matter particles.
- d) Gravitational lensing, a phenomenon first predicted by Einstein's theory of general relativity, offers a unique tool for studying dark matter. When light from distant objects passes near a massive object, such as a galaxy cluster, its path is bent by the gravitational field of the intervening dark matter. This bending creates distortions and magnifications in the observed images of background galaxies, providing clues to the distribution and mass of dark matter. By carefully analysing the patterns of gravitational lensing, scientists can create maps of dark matter in galaxy clusters and probe its properties.

### **Dark Energy Detection:**

- a) Supernova Surveys: Observations of distant supernovae, such as the Supernova Legacy Survey (SNLS) and the Dark Energy Survey (DES), are used to study the luminosity and redshift of these cosmic explosions. By measuring the distances and brightness of supernovae, scientists can infer the expansion history of the universe and constrain the properties of dark energy.
- b) Baryon Acoustic Oscillations (BAO): BAO refers to the imprints left by sound waves in the early universe, which can be observed in the large-scale distribution of galaxies. BAO surveys, such as the Baryon Oscillation Spectroscopic Survey (BOSS), map the positions of galaxies to measure the characteristic scale of these imprints, providing insights into the expansion history and the presence of dark energy.
- c) Cosmic Microwave Background (CMB): High-precision measurements of the CMB, such as those obtained by the Planck satellite, offer a window into the early universe. Scientists analyse the

temperature and polarization patterns in the CMB to study the geometry of space, the amount of dark energy, and its effects on the large-scale structure of the cosmos.

### The Euclid Telescope<sup>[2]</sup>

Future experiments, such as the European Space Agency's Euclid mission and the Rubin Observatory's Legacy Survey of Space and Time, hold the promise of providing further insights into these enigmatic cosmic components. With each technological advance and observational breakthrough, scientists hopefully inch closer to unravelling the secrets of dark matter and dark energy, illuminating the hidden aspects of our universe.

At time of publication, Euclid has been launched on a SpaceX Falcon 9 launch vehicle from Cape Canaveral, Florida, USA. Its operational orbit will be halo around a point known as the Sun-Earth Lagrange point 2 (L2), at an average distance of 1.5 million km beyond Earth's orbit. This special location (see article reference 3) keeps pace with Earth as we orbit the Sun (and also hosts ESA's Gaia[4] and the James Webb Space Telescopes). It will take a few months to get there.

Euclid's mission objectives (from the European Space Agency website) are:

Euclid is designed to explore the evolution of the dark Universe. It will make a 3D-map of the Universe (with time as the third dimension) by observing billions of galaxies out to 10 billion light-years, across more than a third of the sky.

While dark energy accelerates the expansion of the Universe and dark matter governs the growth of cosmic structures, scientists remain unsure about what dark energy and dark matter actually are.


By observing the Universe evolving over the past 10 billion years, Euclid will reveal how it has expanded and how structure has formed over cosmic history - and from this, astronomers can infer the properties of dark energy, dark matter and gravity, to reveal more about their precise nature.

Based on the resulting map of the Universe, they hope to be able to refine models of the universe to start to get closer to an accepted model of the universe.

Fingers crossed for a successful launch and for further clarification of the enigma of dark matter and dark energy.



Being the ski fanatic that you know I am, it might surprise you to learn I'm not a devotee of summer skiing in Switzerland. Unaware of these complications, the thought of skiing in July was irresistible to me and I had to go. So, I gathered up my gear, booked a couple nights at a nice hotel and headed to Zermatt. Unfortunately, weather was not on my side and those winds I mentioned shut down the skiing for the entire weekend. My equipment seemed extra heavy on the way back to Zug. Undeterred, I booked another weekend a short time later.

The line for lift tickets in the morning is ridiculous and you're wearing warm clothes ... in the summer. Hesitantly, I bought the 2-day ticket to avoid a second day in the line after the girl assured me I could get a

refund for any day closed by weather. Up, up, up I went on the long ride to the Klein Matterhorn (3883 m ü.M.). At the top, lies a T-bar, only open in the summer, which takes you to the Gobba di Rollin. At 3899 m ü.M., this lift provides access to the highest pisted skiing in Europe. The views of the nearby Breithorn (4164 m ü.M.) are spectacular, although the ski slope seems a bit flat.

Once you get a bit down to the main place, you might be shocked to see that 2/3s of the small area is roped off and reserved for the ski teams. I could probably have lived with that fact, if it weren't for the obnoxious behaviour of the racers. When not making their official training runs, they all come over to the public area, along with their coaches, for a few more runs at full racing speeds, expecting other skiers to just get out of their way. After being buzzed multiple times by these unyielding maniacs, traveling at least 100 km/hr., I realized that my head and stomach were slightly affected from the altitude and decided to go into the upper station for a hot tea and short rest.

Upon returning to the slopes, I suddenly realized no one was skiing, the ropes were all gone, and I was treated to a blissful run down towards the lift. As I approached the T-bar, which was rolling along, I heard some commotion from behind the shack. Gigi popped out yelling and screaming, wildly pointing at what looked to be a paper plate nailed to the enclosure. At the second lift to get to the top, the Swiss, who runs that lift, scowled at me and without saying a word, tapped his index finger to his Rolex to let me know what was what. Cultural difference, I guess.

Back in the valley, the shuttle bus was bursting at the seams with passengers. As I got on with the doors slamming behind me, I noticed an old woman wobble and almost fall. She had stumbled over a ski team bimbo sitting barefoot in the middle of the floor next to a humungous gear bag. Before I could say, "What the Hell?" Karma struck in the form of a ski boot (not mine) accidentally landing on Heidi's toe. What a day!

Of course the second day shut down for high wind. Sure enough, the partial refund became an issue. I figured I wouldn't get a full half of the money back, only the discounted lesser portion for the second day, but I wasn't ready for that less another 10 CHF. "Whoa, why is it so little?!?" "There is also our work, administrative fee . . . "For what?!?" "Filling out that slip of paper for me to sign?!? Oh Hell no. Get your manager, Karin!" What a weekend!

Ok, so I'm a glutton for punishment and decided to go back a few seasons later. Sure enough, Gigi was still there running the lift. 




















### **Comments / Suggestions captured from the poll**

### **Fiscal Stimulus**

### **New Element Discovered**

Lawrence Livermore Laboratories has discovered the heaviest element yet known to science.

The new element, Governmentium (Gv), has one neutron, 25 assistant neutrons, 88 deputy neutrons, and 198 assistant deputy neutrons, giving it an atomic mass of 312.

These 312 particles are held together by forces called morons, which are surrounded by vast quantities of lepton-like particles called peons.

Since Governmentium has no electrons, it is inert; however, it can be detected, because it impedes every reaction with which it comes into contact. A tiny amount of Governmentium can cause a reaction that would normally take less than a second, to take from 4 days to 4 years to complete.


Dear Mrs. Harris:
